

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Friends of Aztalan go on a Saturday expedition in the fall.

Members of the Friends of Aztalan and numerous other interested folks took a guided bus tour that visited numerous archaeological features of the area around Aztalan, Fort Atkinson, and Lake Koshkonong.

The group visited a small platform mound (now owned by the Archaeological Conservancy, The Hoard Museum in Fort Atkinson, the new Jefferson County mounds park, The Fort Atkinson Intaglio mound, and numerous mounds on Lake Koshkonong.

Guides and interpreters included State Archaeologist John Broihan, Asst. State Archaeologist Amy Rosebrough, and planner at the Garmin Preserver(and Lifetime Friends of Aztalan member) Margaret Burlingham, as well as Bob Birmingham.



Awardwinning Aztalan Book and Video Available In 2006, Bob Birmingham and longtime Aztalan researcher Lynne Goldstein published the book Aztalan: Mysteries of an Ancient Indian Town, an up-to date history and description of the site, illustrated with many pictures, maps, and artifacts.

The book was published by the Wisconsin Historical Society and has since won the History Merit Independent award from the Publishers Association. It sells for a verv affordable \$14.95 and available from the Glacial Drumlin -Aztalan State Park headquarters Rose Gallery and the in Lake Mills, the Velvetine Rabbit bookshop and Hoard Museum in Fort Atkinson, and the Historical Society Museum in Madison. It is also available at most major book stores and can ordered on line from the Wisconsin Historical Society www.wisconsinhistory.org/whspress and other on-line booksellers.

In February, Wisconsin Public Television finished production of a promotional and educational video called Aztalan: National Historic Landmark in collaboration with the Friends of Aztalan State Park and fully

funded by the Friends as a 2006 goal. It was produced in two versions, one for the general public, and a second, with an ending requesting donations, to be used for fundraising for the new visitor's center. Members will all receive a free copy of the promotional/ educational video and it will also be liberally distributed to area schools, municipalities, civic organizations and Department of Tourism. Those that want

help raise funds from businesses and organizations can also request the second version. Plans are also underway to put the videos online as streaming videos on several major websites and to make it available


