Boszhardt to speak at Annual Meeting.

Noted archaeologist and Wisconsin Archeological Society President Robert "Ernie" Boszhardt will be the featured speaker at this year's annual meeting, scheduled for January 29, at Hoard Museum, 401 Whitewater St., Fort Atkinson. The dinner meeting is scheduled for 5:30 PM. Mr. Boszhardt will discuss recent work near the Mississippian platform mound at Trempealeau, Wisconsin that revealed a Mississippian habitation site that may be earlier than Aztalan. The people at the site appear to have been immigrants from southern Illinois and he will discuss how the discovery relates to Aztalan and Cahokia history. A business meeting will precede the talk that

will include the election and reelection of several board members. Anyone interested in nominating themselves or others for board membership should contact President Kurt Sampson.

The meeting will include dinner featuring pork and chicken dishes with vegetables, potatoes and cake for dessert.

Were Chumkey Stomes Made at Aztalam?



Recent examination of the Albert Kracht artifact collection at the Aztalan Historical Society Museum seems to indicate that yes, Chunkey stones were indeed manufactured by the residents of Aztalan.

Albert Kracht, former owner of the land that is now part of Aztalan State Park, collected artifacts from the Aztalan site in the first half of the twentieth century. In September 2010 I began a project for the Lake Mills Aztalan Historical Society to photograph both the Albert Kracht and the H.B. Jaycox collection housed in museum. In the course of photographing the collection, I noticed that two of the objects, currently labeled as polishing stones, were in fact Chunkey stones in various stages of manufacture. These two items provide evidence that Chunkev stones were made at Aztalan, and gives some clues as to how they were manufactured.

Item A in the photograph shows the earliest stages of the making of a Chunkey stone. Notice that a stone close in size to the final object was selected. It clearly shows that one of the first steps in manufacture was pecking out an area to mark the center of the stone. Both sides were marked in this manner. One edge of this stone apparently was being shaped into a rough arc.



The second stone in the collection (*Item B*) is a Chunkey much further along in its' construction. Notice that the center shows the same pecking to mark the center of the stone as the Chunkey stone previously mentioned (*Item A*). This particular stone has assumed its cylindrical shape. For whatever reason, this Chunkey stone's

concave surfaces were never completed before being lost or abandoned.

It is also interesting to note that S.A. Barrett's book 'Ancient Aztalan' shows a Chunkey stone in the process of being made.

Barrett recognized this object for what it was and lists it as a 'Discoidal unfinished.' This particular object is even further along in its construction with at least one of the concave surfaces partially completed.

Item C shows a completed Chunkey stone found at Aztalan and now part of the Aztalan museum collection.

The evidence presented here clearly shows that while some Chunkey stones may have been imported to the site by the early residents of Aztalan, Chunkey stones were indeed being painstakingly manufactured here. It also proves that close examination of artifacts from existing collections, such as those housed in the Aztalan museum, can still yield interesting archeological information.
