

## Friends Receive Grant for Mound Step Replacement

MINING THE PROPERTY OF THE PRO

The Friends of Aztalan State Park received a grant of \$4,000 from the Friends of Wisconsin State Parks Stewardship Grant Program to assist the park replace the wooden steps on the northwest and southwest platform mounds. The original steps were put in decades ago following archaeological excavations and have begun to rot, creating a potential public

safety hazard. The grant will be matched with another \$6,400 from the Friends in the form of cash and labor for a total project cost of \$10, 400. President Kurt Sampson wrote the grant proposition with the assistance of park ranger Lance Stock and board member Wendy Catalani- Davies made a generous donation to be used as part of the cash match.

# Comparing the Size of Aztalan Southwest Mound and Monks Mound


Rising above the western banks of the Crawfish River in southern Wisconsin, the stepped mound on the southwestern corner of Aztalan offers a commanding view of the archeological site and the surrounding countryside. This mound is also one of Aztalan's most imposing features.

As large as this mound is, it pales beside the sheer size of Monks Mound at the Middle Mississippian city of Cahokia. Then again, most prehistoric structures in the western hemisphere are dwarfed by the dimensions of Monks mound. Depending on how one measures the size of Monks Mound (the mound has experienced significant slumping since it was abandoned in the mid-14th century), the base of the mound measures just over 900 ft (north - south) by 720 feet (east - west), covering a total area over 14 acres. Monks Mound rises just over 100 feet above the surrounding land surface. At this size, according to William

Iseminger's recent book "Cahokia Mounds", only the Mesoamerican pyramids at Cholula and the Pyramid of the Sun in Teotihuacan are larger in overall size.

In comparison, the Southwest pyramid mound at Aztalan measures approximately 185 by 130 feet at the base, and To better compare the sizes of the two mounds, the composite pictures shown here of both mounds give some idea of grand scale of Monks Mound when compared to the Southwest Mound at Aztalan.

The difference in size of these two prehistoric earthworks is striking



approximately 16 feet in height. Given these dimensions, Monks Mound covers roughly 27 times the surface area at the base of the mound than the Southwest mound at Aztalan.

indeed, but in no way should diminishes the importance of the Aztalan mound to those who dwelled at Aztalan over 900 years ago.


## Volumteers Needed for Information Center
